It is my honor to submit to you the 2016 Annual report for the Middletown Division of Fire. This report will show the activities performed by the personnel of the Division of Fire during the past year. In addition to an explanation of the services that we provide, you will find statistical data related to the delivery of these services to the citizens of Middletown and the actions taken to support the response activities.

2016 was a very exciting year for the Division of Fire. I am pleased to report that we have improved our ability to deliver fire and EMS services to the citizens of Middletown. During this past year, we were awarded the SAFER Grant from the Federal Government funding 12 Firefighter/EMT positions at a cost of \$1.8 million over two years. In addition, we were able to hire two additional Firefighter/EMT's from the City's General Fund. There were also several promotions within the Division of Fire in 2016.

2016 also presented challenges for the Division of Fire, none more prevalent than the opioid epidemic that has been felt all over the United States. In June of 2016, we implemented a Heroin Response Team that consists of a Police Officer, Paramedic, and drug addiction counselor. The team visits prior opioid overdose patients and encourages them to seek treatment for their addiction.

Also in 2016 we created the Middletown Fire Investigation Task Force. This is an investigative unit comprised of Division of Fire Investigators and Division of Police Detectives who have completed training specific to fire and arson investigations. This team has proven to be very successful and shows how the cooperation between the City of Middletown's Public Safety Divisions is a positive resource for the community.

In conclusion, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Deputy Chief David Adams who coordinated the development of this annual report. As you read through this report, you will find the statistical data that documents the daily activities of the Division of Fire. 

# Hazardous Materials

Middletown Fire Department is one of three departments that make up the response units for the Butler County Regional Hazardous Materials Team. Hamilton and West Chester complete the team.

Hamilton, Middletown and West Chester Township, in addition to Hazardous Materials Technicians from Fairfield Township Fire Department, Liberty Township Fire Department, Monroe Fire Department, and Oxford Fire Department make up the Butler County Haz-Mat Co-op. This agreement provides for regional response within the entire County.

Political subdivisions in the County requiring additional Hazardous Material team Response, may request additional resources from the Haz-Mat co-op through mutual aid. This program also provides for training of department personnel in various aspects of Hazardous Materials response and control. This includes testing and maintenance of equipment.

All Middletown Fire personnel are certified to the Operations level of responder. Several firefighters are further trained to the Technician level. Middletown Fire Dept. is working in conjunction with the International Association of Firefighters to provide, at no cost, Haz-Mat technician certification training for additional personnel in 2017.

This training has Middletown firefighters ready to deploy with the Haz-Mat team to mitigate poison, radiological, and chemical emergencies within our response area. The department maintains and tests multi gas meters for each front line apparatus and Haz-Mat response unit.


In 2016 Middletown fire responded to 32 Hazardous Material incidents with the Haz-Mat unit responding to 3 of these emergencies. The most serious was an acid leak at Pilot Chemical. The incident required the response of the entire county Haz-Mat teams. Crews used the reverse 911 system to instruct citizens to shelter in place, while Middletown fire crews secured the safety of children at Amanda Elementary School. The leak was mitigated without injury to responders or citizens.

## **TECHNICAL RESCUE TEAM (BCTR)**

The Butler County Technical Rescue Team is an effort of the Butler County Emergency Management Agency and Butler County Technical Rescue Governing Board and operates under the tenants the Technical Rescue Governing Board and the Butler County Technical Rescue Administrative & Operational Polices.

Team members are comprised of trained personnel from qualified first responder agencies, including fire, police and other departments that will be an asset to the mission of the Technical Rescue Team.

Currently, Butler County Technical Rescue Team has over 65 technicians specially trained in:

- **Confined Space**
- **Trench Rescue**
- **High Angle Rescue**
- **Search & Rescue**
- **Structure Collapse**
- **Swift Water Rescue**
- **Flood Rescue**



BCTR Team had six trainings through 2016 and members (Ludwig, VonBargen, McClure, and Riley) attended the required 50% of the trainings to remain in good standing with the team.

# **Emergency Medical Services**

**Middletown Division of Fire responded to 9268 EMS calls in 2016. This represents an increase of 4.5% over 2015.**

**We received help from our neighboring communities 194 times while returning the favor 55 times. This was done while maintaining the lowest staffing level the division has seen in recent times. The operational profile was a minimum of 13 personnel running Combo companies. There were 4 front line Combo Companies in service and a 5th when staffing permitted.**

**The City of Middletown continued to feel the impact of the Opiate epidemic with a marked increase in EMS responses. EMS units responded to 532 opiate overdoses. These 532 incidents resulted in 77 deaths. Meth, cocaine, prescription drug abuse, and flakka incidences made for additional calls.**

**City Manager, Doug Adkins started a Heroin Summit in spring of 2015 which was broken into sub-committees. The Heroin Response Team (HRT) came out of one of those committees and started in June of 2016. The team consists of a police officer, a paramedic and an alcohol and drug addiction counselor (provided by Alcohol Drug and Mental Health Service Board).**

**The team visits prior overdose patients and/or families shortly after their incident. The goal is to close the gap between getting users to treatment and their families to support groups.**

**257 names of users were collected through overdose responses, referrals from requests for help, or public safety personnel talking with known users.**

**132 were able to be contacted and 71 of those individuals (54%) made their way to a treatment center**



# EMS 2016 Training

The fourteen (14) probationary firefighters hired during 2016 completed a combined 1,440 hours of recruit training to prepare them for integration in the Fire Operations Division.

# **FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU**

The Fire Prevention Bureau manages several important functions which include: fire inspections, plan reviews, public and private education, data collection and analysis.

## **OBJECTIVE:**

The main objective of the Fire Prevention Bureau is to promote prevention and awareness through a proactive approach to fire safety.

## **SPECIFIC DUTIES:**

Provide public education and fire safety awareness programs.

Enforce fire, building, and life-safety codes and ordinances.

Conduct fire and life-safety inspections.

Review plans for fire protection systems and life safety concerns.

Witness the testing of fire protection and life safety equipment.

Maintain public relations and respond to citizens' concerns regarding fire-safety.

Evaluate and update codes to stay current with city needs.

## **NEW CONSTRUCTION AND SPRINKLER PLAN REVIEW:**

Plans for fire alarm systems, sprinkler systems, and hood and duct suppression systems, are reviewed for compliance in relation to adopted codes and regulations.

## **PUBLIC EDUCATION:**

The most effective method of fire prevention is public education.

Middletown Firefighters visit the local schools in October (National Fire prevention month) to teach fire safety. The Fire Safety House, a mobile classroom, regularly visits parks and other community events such as the National Night out.

## **2016 Inspection stats:**

Conducted **10** foster/adoption home inspections.

As a department, we conducted **1399** fire safety inspections of commercial properties.

# 2016 Fire Investigation Task Force - Annual Report

The Middletown Fire Investigation Task Force (Task Force) is a multi-discipline unit comprised of detectives and investigators from the Divisions of Police and Fire. All personnel assigned to the Task Force have completed a minimum of fifty (50) hours of training specific to fire and explosion investigations.

During 2016, the Middletown Fire Investigation Task Force (Task Force), conducted seventy (70) origin and cause investigations with the following determined to be incendiary in nature.

This represents an arrest/closure rate of forty-six percent (46%) of all identified incendiary (arson) fires which were investigated by the Task Force. It is anticipated the closure rate for incendiary fires which occurred during 2016 will increase as many of the open investigations are still active.

Investigators assigned to the Task Force completed eight (8) hours of in-service training specific to Origin and Cause investigations with one (1) investigator attending thirty-two (32) hours of tested training during the International Association of Arson Investigators (IAAI) International Training Conference.

Additionally, an accelerant canine (K9) was added to the Task Force to assist with the detection of ignitable liquids (accelerants) at fire scenes. Investigator Chris Klug and K9 "Scottie" began their initial training in October of 2016 and are expected to be certified by the United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) in May of 2017.



## HYDRANTS / WATER SUPPLY

### GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

The program guarantees that all the fire hydrants are located, inspected for damage or defects, and are accessible. Targeted fire hydrants are flushed and flow tested and records are kept on static and residual water flow on an annual basis. By comparing these numbers from year to year water system problems can be found and corrected.

All data is collected and water flow numbers are submitted to the Water Department and the Public Works Department. Any defects or mechanical problems found are documented and reported to the Water/Sewer Department for repairs. The data collected is also used in pre-plan development and for fire water-flow calculations. The inter-agency cooperation in developing long range goals for the water distribution system has also been a result of data collection and analysis of the entire water system.

### 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

- Due to run volume and staffing this year Comp time was offered to off-duty personnel to inspect and flush city fire hydrants. A total of **247.25** labor hours were used to accomplish this. This time was used in a fashion that would not cause overtime pay in accordance with Division of Fire policies.
- The Public Works Department continued to repair all reported defects and damaged hydrants on a timely basis. **122** individual hydrants were reported to the water department as needing repairs. Several minor defects, such as missing gaskets were rectified by fire personnel during flushing. **11** Hydrants were identified as being out of service for various reasons.
- 
- Fire personnel continue to work with Public Works and Engineering Departments to improve the mapping of hydrant locations.
- 
- In 2016, approximately **1100** hydrants were inspected and flushed. Geographically this can be shown as beginning at the river and proceeding eastward to the Mayfield neighborhood covering all neighborhoods North and South of this area. This encompasses nearly 50% of the city's hydrants within Butler County. Warren County hydrants are not serviced by the City of Middletown.

Repairs were made to SCBA face pieces, RIC packs, and SAR units as needed. Some repairs were only adjustments, while others involved replacing damaged or worn parts.

(Additional flow tests were completed if needed, after a repair).
