Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department strive to bring people and organizations together to improve community wellness. This CHIP report was adopted by leadership of the three health departments in May 2024.

The 2024-2026 CHIP report is the second of these reports released, all following a CHA. We want to provide the best possible care for our residents, and we can use this report to guide us in our strategic planning concerning future programs, clinics, and health resources.

The CHIP would not have been possible without the help of numerous organizations. It is vital that assessments such as this continue so that we can know where to direct our resources and use them in the most advantageous ways.

More importantly, the possibility of this report relies solely on the participation of individuals in our community who committed to participating in interviews and completing health need prioritization surveys. 

INTRODUCTION

WHAT IS A COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CHIP)?



A **Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)** is part of a framework that is used to guide community benefit activities - policy, advocacy, and program-planning efforts. The CHIP is a county-wide collaborative health plan developed for Butler County and the cities of Hamilton and Middletown. Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department are the lead agencies in coordinating and guiding this process. The plan is an effort to utilize existing resources and to develop new collaborations in order to improve the health of our residents.

OVERVIEW OF THE PROCESS



In order to develop a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department followed a process that included the following steps:

STEP 1: Plan and prepare for the CHIP.

STEP 2: Develop goals/objectives and identify indicators to address health needs.

STEP 3: Consider approaches/strategies to address prioritized needs, health disparities, and social determinants of health.

STEP 4: Select approaches with community partners.

STEP 5: Integrate CHIP with community partners and health department plans.

STEP 6: Develop a written CHIP.

STEP 7: Adopt the CHIP.

STEP 8: Update and sustain the CHIP.

Within each step of this process, the guidelines and requirements of both the state and federal governments are followed precisely and systematically.



DEFINING THE BUTLER COUNTY SERVICE AREAS









PLAN AND PREPARE FOR THE 2024-2026 COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CHIP)

The 2023 Community Health Assessment (CHA) for Butler County and the cities of Middletown and Hamilton, Ohio was developed through a collaborative process of collecting and analyzing data, involving many sectors of the community. The three area health departments partnered with local government, for-profits, non-profits, community foundations, health care providers, academia, and area agencies, and ensured the representation of populations that are at higher health risk or have poorer health outcomes. These community partners formed the CHA Advisory Committee and met regularly from January through June 2023. Using the MAPP process, the Committee has highlighted areas for improvement, identified resources, and set the stage to adopt priorities and policies and develop plans to address community health outcomes.

Secondary and primary data were collected to complete the 2023 CHA report. (Available at

https://health.bcohio.gov/about_us/community_health_assessment.php).

Secondary data were collected from a variety of local, county and state sources to present community demographics, social determinants of health, health care access, birth characteristics, leading causes of death, chronic disease, health behaviors, mental health, substance use, and preventive practices. The analysis of secondary data yielded a preliminary list of significant health needs, which then informed primary data collection.

Primary data was collected through a survey, focus groups, and a Forces of Change Assessment and SWOT Analysis. There were **907** responses to the **2023 CHA Survey** from community members. There were **2** focus groups held across the county, representing a total of 33 community members. The primary data collection process was designed to validate secondary data findings, identify additional community issues, solicit information on disparities among subpopulations, ascertain community assets potentially available to address needs and prioritize health needs. More detail on methodology can be found in the 2023 CHA Report.

The community health improvement plan (CHIP) deals with the “how and when” of addressing needs. While the community health assessment considers the “who, what, where and why” of community health needs, the CHIP takes care of the how and when components.


Ohio Department of Health (ODH) Requirements

The following image shows the framework from ODH that this report followed while also adhering to federal requirements and the community's needs.

Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department desired to align with the priorities and indicators of the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). To do this, they used the following guidelines when prioritizing the health needs of their community.

First, the health departments used the same language as the state of Ohio when assessing the factors and health outcomes of their community in the 2023 Community Health Assessment.

ADDRESSING THE HEALTH NEEDS

The 2023 Community Health Assessment (CHA) identified significant health needs from an extensive review of the primary and secondary data.



The most important factors for a healthy community identified in the 2023 CHA Survey were:

- #1 Access to health care
- #2 Low crime/safe neighborhoods
- #3 Affordable housing
- #4 Access to mental health and substance use treatment
- #5 Well-paying jobs
- #6 Access to food

To generate a final list of priority health needs to address in the 2024-2026 Community Health Improvement Plan, Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department followed a process to prioritize health needs where they reviewed each of the significant health needs according to a set of criteria:

- **Organizational capacity** – Health departments have the capacity to address the issue.
- **Existing infrastructure** – Health departments have programs, systems, staff and support resources in place to address the issue.
- **Established relationships** – There are established relationships with community partners to address the issue.
- **Ongoing investment** – Existing resources are committed to the issue. Staff time and financial resources for this issue are counted as part of our community benefit effort/strategic plan.
- **Focus area** – Health departments have acknowledged competencies and expertise to address the issue and the issue fits with the organizational missions.

ADDRESSING THE HEALTH NEEDS



From the significant health needs, Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department chose health needs that considered the health department's capacity to address community needs, the strength of community partnerships, and those needs that correspond with the health department's priorities.

In both Butler County* and Ohio experienced frequent mental distress (2+ weeks/ month in the past year). Rates were higher for Middletown (19%) and Hamilton (18%)¹¹



Butler County's* suicide rate was 12.9 per 100,000 in 2017-2021, lower than the state rate of 14.8 per 100,000¹²



The drug poisoning death rate in Butler County* was 49 per 100,000 from 2018-2020, higher than the state (38 per 100,000)¹²

of both Butler County* and Ohio adults reported they have had a **stroke**. Rates are **higher** for Middletown and Hamilton (both 4%)¹³



of Butler County* adults reported having had a **heart attack, angina, or coronary heart disease** (the leading cause of death), compared to 8% for Ohio. Rates are **higher** for Middletown and Hamilton (both 7%)¹³



of Butler County* adults have **diabetes**, compared to 12% for the state. Rates are **higher** for Middletown (12%) and Hamilton (11%)¹³



of Butler County* adults have **chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)**, compared to 9% for Ohio. Rates are **higher** for Middletown (10%) and Hamilton (9%)¹³





EVALUATION OF IMPACT

Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department will monitor and evaluate the programs and actions outlined above. We anticipate the actions taken to address significant health needs will improve health knowledge, behaviors, and status, increase access to care, and overall help support good health. The health departments are committed to monitoring key indicators to assess impact. Our reporting process includes the collection and documentation of tracking measures, such as the number of people reached/served and collaborative efforts to address health needs. A review of the impact of health department actions to address these significant health needs will be reported in the next scheduled CHA.

ADDITIONAL HEALTH NEEDS NOT DIRECTLY ADDRESSED

Since Butler County General Health District, City of Hamilton Health Department, and City of Middletown Health Department cannot directly address all the health needs present in the community, we will concentrate our resources on those health needs where we can effectively impact our region given our areas of focus and expertise. Taking existing organization and community resources into consideration, Butler County will not directly address the remaining health needs identified in the CHA, including but not limited to crime and violence, environmental conditions, internet access, access to childcare, access to healthcare education, HIV/AIDS and STIs, economic stability, and COVID-19. We will continue to look for opportunities to address community needs where we can make a meaningful contribution. Community partnerships may support other initiatives that the health department cannot independently lead in order to address the other health needs identified in the 2023 CHA.
